- 2 Cancelled in 2011, *which* anarchic panel show featured regular team captains Ulrika Jonsson, Mark Lamarr and Jack Dee and marked the rise to fame of Matt Lucas in the guise of George Dawes?
- 3 Who said of his London exhibition, later taken to New York, Sao Paulo and Rio: "it was great to see an individual or groups of people pointing at the horizon. This transfer of the stillness of sculpture to the stillness of an observer is exciting, reflexivity becoming shared."?

- 5 On geological time lines, a number of ages makes an epoch; a number of epochs makes a period and a number of periods makes an era. What does a number of eras make?
- 6 What four-letter word meaning a cycle of duty also denotes the collection of golf courses that host The Open, a Norse Valkyrie – and is the surname of the Italian composer who won the Best Original Score Oscar for *The Godfather (Part II)*?
